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Introduction

INTRODUCING LENT

Over the centuries, the Church developed the liturgical calendar as a tool to help the people of God remember and celebrate the full mystery of the Gospel as revealed and fulfilled in Jesus Christ, the Son of God and Redeemer of the world. The liturgical seasons are: Advent, Christmas, Epiphany, Lent, Easter, and Pentecost. Each season helps us enter the mystery of the Gospel drawing our attention to a different aspects of the life, death, resurrection, ascension and promised return of Jesus.

The origins of Lent lie in the early church, which reserved Easter for baptism, the sacrament of initiation into the household of God. Catechumens (or people seeking baptism) would spend a season preparing themselves for Easter and the sacrament. By the early 4th Century, this season had become a 40 day period, paralleling the 40 years Israel spent in the wilderness in repentance and the 40 days Jesus spent in the wilderness fasting and suffering temptation. This period was used not only by catechumens, but also their entire congregations to remember their own baptisms and prepare for the celebration of Easter.

Beginning on Ash Wednesday and ending with the Easter Vigil, Lent, specifically, draws our attention to Jesus' suffering and self-sacrifice. Purple is used through most of the season because it symbolizes royalty, suffering and repentance. As Lent draws our attention to Jesus' suffering, the season invites us into spiritual practices that help us see our own role in Jesus' suffering and to grow in his selfless likeness.

Ash Wednesday comes from the tradition of Christians receiving ashes on their foreheads. In the Bible, especially the Old Testament, ashes symbolize our frailty and sorrow, and so we see God's people of old using ashes during seasons of deep repentance and lamentation. The final week of Lent is Holy Week. It begins with Palm Sunday, which commemorates Jesus entry into Jerusalem and reception as King. Maundy Thursday commemorates the Passover meal Jesus shared with his disciples during which Jesus washed his disciples feet and instituted the Lord's Supper as a sacrament. The name "Maundy" comes from the Latin *mandatum novum*, meaning "new commandment" because after washing his disciples feet, Jesus tells them: "A new commandment I give to you, love one another as I have loved you." (John 13:34). On Good Friday, we remember the death of Jesus on the cross. While tragic, we call the day good because Jesus' death means forgiveness and new life for his people. The final day of Lent is the Easter Vigil. It's a day of waiting and anticipation for the celebration Easter Sunday, the resurrection of our Lord Jesus Christ, which is the end of all sin and death. Hallelujah!

The Sundays in Lent are in the season but not of it, and are celebrated as "feast" days, traditionally days on which Lenten fasts are broken as we gather together for worship and to celebrate Christ's resurrection.

Purple is the color of Lent. It signifies penitence and humility, and is meant to remind us of humanity's suffering under sin and of Christ's suffering on the cross - the color of a bruise. Purple is also the color of royalty and anticipates the coming glory of Christ's resurrection on Easter.

We all have different reactions to the season of Lent and its practices. Some of us come from traditions and congregations that observe Lent and explain it well. Some of us observe Lent by practicing some measure of austerity but without really understanding why. Some of us know Lent only by what immediately precedes it: Mardi Gras or Carnival or Pancake Tuesday. Still, there are those of us who never have observed it and do not know why we should. Regardless of our experiences and reactions, it is important to consider the meaning of Lent, as well as how and why we should observe it.

KEEPING LENT

How do we keep a holy Lent? We encourage you to consider the following:

Self-examination: Self-examination is critical to keeping Lent because without it, repentance is impossible. As Lamentations 3:40 says: "Let us examine and probe our ways, and let us return to the LORD." So, use Lent as an opportunity to ask yourself some hard questions about your desires and habits, your ambitions and failures, your hopes and fears, and your pride and shame. The Holy Spirit uses this kind of intentional self-examination to reveal our sin and idolatry, or all the ways we seek life apart from God.

Self-denial: Consider fasting during Lent. This practice of self-denial helps us to remember that we do not live by bread alone (Matthew 4:4) and that Jesus is the true bread of life (John 6:35). How? As we abstain from food, beverage, and other excesses, we deprive ourselves of the things that make us feel self-sufficient and protected. It's in this place where we confront the temptation to live apart from God as our own gods. It's in this place that we can confront our sin and hear with fresh ears the Good News that Jesus has defeated sin and death and invites us to live with him.

We recommend fasting by giving up a food, beverage, or activity that you often turn to for comfort. Perhaps this is chocolate, chips, beer or wine. Perhaps it is watching TV or spending time on social media. As you consider what to abstain from, you may feel the need to abstain from more than one thing. Another way to fast is to give up one meal a day, especially if you're in the habit of eating out. If you would like to practice a full day of complete fasting (no food, but water/juice allowed), we recommend doing so on Ash Wednesday or Good Friday. These are the traditional days for full fasting for many Christians around the world.

As fasting moves us to a dependence on God for our satisfaction, it creates space for us to experience the joy of fellowship with God and one another. For example, a little less time watching TV leads to a little more time for reflection and fellowship. A little less money spent on yourself leads to a little more generosity to those around you. Fasting always leads to feasting. As you fast and find more space, consider new practices you can re-engage or take up.

Since we do not live the Christian life alone, consider fasting with your small group, friends, roommates or family. Is there something you can all give up and a practice you can all take on?

On that note, please remember that Sundays are never fast days; they are feast days.

Jesus rose from the dead on the first day of the week, and we celebrate that fact every Sunday, even during Lent! This is why the Sundays in Lent are not part of the season. So during Lent, take a break from fasting on Sundays and remember with joy that our salvation is a gracious gift from God!

Self-giving: As self-examination and self-denial turn us away from self to God, the practices also create more and more room in our lives for others. So for centuries, Christians have used Lent as a time to cultivate compassion, or love of neighbor, especially the poor, oppressed and marginalized.

There are many ways to this. Here are a few suggestions: Consider taking any money or time saved from fasting and giving it to these mercy and service Orange County organizations:

The Means of Grace: Finally, undergirding self-examination, self-denial and self-giving are the means of grace. Historically, the church has said there are three means of grace, or instruments through which God helps us turn to him and grow more and more like Christ: prayer, scripture and sacraments.

As we turn to God, prayer becomes natural. We offer to God our hearts, souls and minds in prayer, and in turn, we discover God's attention is already fixed on us and that he's listening and ready to speak to us. In Scripture, we hear God's life-giving word to us and we are reminded over and over again of the Good News, that he comes to us in Jesus Christ. In the Sacraments, we physically experience the presence of God and his promises. Moreover, the Sacraments remind us that we are to experience the entirety of our Christian lives in community with our brother and sisters in Jesus Christ.

So, if regular times of Bible study and prayer have never been part of your life or they once were but have become less so, then Lent is a wonderful time to re-engage: Consider framing your days with short times of prayer and study in the mornings or evenings or both. Join a small group or ask your family or roommates to join you in periodic morning and/or evening prayer.

And make it a point to attend Sunday worship services. Our faith is a communal faith. We are not meant observe Lent alone. We are not meant to follow Jesus on our own. There are many today who identify themselves as Christians but for whom the church is peripheral and tangential. If this sounds like you, then use this Lenten season to commit yourself to the community of God's people.

If you identify as a follower of Christ and yet have never been baptized, then make every effort to be baptized as soon as possible. If you have been baptized, remember that in baptism you were incorporated into a community, the family of God, and that you are to join in the family meal, the Eucharist.

All in all, Lent is a natural time to live into a “Rule of Life”—a way of structuring our ordinary days with Christian practices that root us in the Holy Spirit and gently guide us towards God and God’s love manifested in the life, death and resurrection of Jesus Christ. By taking time to practice the a Rule during Lent, we strengthen our existing spiritual habits and nourish new ones that God uses to sustain us throughout the year.

EASTER SEASON

There’s much wisdom in preparing for Easter for 40 days because Easter itself is a 50 day celebration in response to the resurrection of Jesus Christ, his victory over sin and death, and his gift of new and everlasting life. Easter is much more than a fun weekend of chocolates, pastel outfits, egg hunts, and spiral hams! If we take time to prepare for a wedding, an anniversary, a birthday, a graduation, a vacation, an athletic competition or any other special occasion, how much more should we prepare for Easter, the feast of feasts?

So, whereas Lent is marked by mourning and fasting, Easter is marked by boisterous celebration. Find ways to feast with your brothers and sisters. Continue leaning into the means of grace. It’s a season to celebrate the new life Jesus makes possible in all areas of our lives!

THE GUIDE

To help you keep a holy Lent, we offer this guide. The guide begins on Ash Wednesday and ends on Easter Sunday. The Daily Morning & Evening Prayers include daily readings in the Psalms, Old & New Testaments, and Gospels, as well as weekly prayers and songs to help remind you that God is with you and ready to speak to you because he loves you.

The guide and our recommendations for Lent are not meant to burden you. They are meant to help you enter into the death and resurrection of Christ and find new life. So our final encouragements: Practice Lent as best as you can. This season, like the entirety of Christian life, is not about perfection! Start with a few practices and build on them, or go deeper in the practices you already have. Whether using the guide on your own or with your family, friends, or small group, follow the entire guide or focus on a part.

It is a great joy for us to be family with you in this congregation. We are so thankful that God has brought us together and we are honored to be able to worship and serve our Lord together with you. May Christ grant us all a blessed Lent and Easter!

Lent for Families

“Allow the children to come to me,” Jesus said. “Don’t forbid them, because the kingdom of heaven belongs to people like these children.” – Matthew 19:14

“I think we underestimate kids. Small children’s ability to understand difficult theological concepts is enormous.” – Madeleine L’Engle

Lent is an excellent time of the year to intentionally invite our children into the story of Jesus by creating family traditions and cultivating a culture of worship together. We can remind our kids of how Advent was a season of preparation for Christmas, so Lent is a season of preparation for Easter. To best prepare for the glory of Jesus’ resurrection, here are some suggestions to consider doing with your children and youth:

Family Worship

Try observing family worship together thirty minutes before bedtime – teeth are brushed, pajamas are on. And depending on circumstances, attentiveness of the children, etc. plan on anywhere from 10-20 minutes.

Perhaps you might:

- Practice the Lenten Candles (see the next page for details)
- Read and discuss the Scripture passage for the day.
- Read and discuss a children’s Bible story book, like the Jesus Storybook Bible.
- Pray together.
- Sing a Lenten song together (see appendix).

Family Fasting

Fasting, self-denial, helps us see how we turn to things other than God for our comfort. Fasting can involve food and non-food items. As a family, consider fasting together and what to fast from. Perhaps everyone can abstain from a nightly dessert, or devices or screen time after a certain time. Whatever it is, make the fast simple and something that everyone can participate in. Remember: Sundays are feast days, so break your fast on Sundays, and celebrate the resurrection!

Family Giving

Cultivate a habit of charity and self-giving. As we turn to God, we naturally turn to those around us in need. Review the local organizations listed on page 4 and serve one of them as a family, or get creative and help your children become generous by giving away old, or even new, toys and items to others.

Sunday Worship Services

The Lenten season is a wonderful time to help your children realize that the church is their family, that worship should be their first duty and greatest joy. Make Sunday worship a priority.

Consider Having Your Children Baptized

If your children are yet to be baptized, Lent is a wonderful time to consider having them baptized during the Easter season! If your children are older and haven’t been baptized, begin having conversations with them about baptism. Preparation for First Communion

If your children understand the gospel, then this season could be a wonderful time to take the steps toward having them admitted to the Lord’s Table for their First Communion. Lenten Candles

Whereas Advent is a season of ever-increasing light anticipating the incarnation of Christ, Lent is a season of ever-decreasing light approaching His crucifixion. Light is gradually extinguished to symbolize the journey through the wilderness and toward the cross and tomb.

Unlike Advent where a new candle is lit each week and the light slowly gets brighter, during Lent each week gets progressively darker, until there is complete darkness on Good Friday. On Easter Sunday all of the candles are lit as we celebrate the best news ever that He is risen!

As you walk through Lent and Holy week, the candles will visually remind you of the powerful truth that “The light shines in the darkness, and the darkness has not overcome it” (John 1:5). But for a while on Good Friday and Holy Saturday it may have seemed as if the darkness was overcoming – for a long while.

What do you need?

- Seven purple candles
- One white candle (the Christ candle)
- Optional: a tray to hold all the candles.

How do the Lenten Candles Work?

Begin on Ash Wednesday by lighting all eight candles.

Read the appointed Psalm(s) and/or Gospel passage for the evening.

After the reading, say “The light shines in the darkness, and the darkness have not overcome it.” Then snuff out one candle. Do not light it again until Easter.

Each evening you can light the candles that have not been snuffed out and read the appointed Psalm(s) and/or Gospel passage.

On each Sunday you say the words of John 1:5, “The light shines in the darkness, and the darkness have not overcome it” and snuff out an additional purple candle.

On Good Friday you follow the same pattern and snuff out the white Christ candle. Leave all the candles unlit on Holy Saturday.

On Easter Sunday, with great joy, light all the candles and boldly say, “The light shines in the darkness, and the darkness have not overcome it!”

An alternative practice is to just do the candles during Holy Week. If you do that, buy five purple candles and one white candle. You will start snuffing purple candles out on Palm Sunday and then the white candle on Good Friday.

Morning Prayer for Ash Wednesday

March 2nd, 2022

LENTEN MEDITATION

Lent begins on Ash Wednesday; the day many Christians receive a cross of ashes on their foreheads. Why? In Scripture, ashes are a public sign of confession and repentance, as well as a plea for God's help, mercy, compassion and forgiveness. Ashes are also a sign of human frailty and dependence on God, the creator of all things. As Lent begins, consider attending our Ash Wednesday service. Also prayerfully consider the following questions in light of the scripture lessons: In what ways have I been running away from God or doubting God's love for me? What hopes of healing do I have for myself and the world around me?

PRAYER

God of the desert, as we follow Jesus into the unknown, may we recognize the tempter when he comes; let it be your bread we eat, your world we serve and you alone we worship. This we ask through Jesus Christ our Redeemer. Amen.

READINGS: Psalm 51 & Isaiah 58:1-12

Evening Prayer for Ash Wednesday

LENTEN MEDITATION

40 Reasons to Observe Lent by Peter Leithart

To observe Lent rightly, we have to be persuaded that we already stand in God's favor.

Ash Wednesday reminds us to number our days. It helps us gain a heart of wisdom (Psalm 90:12).

We keep Easter to manifest and deepen our prior share in resurrection. We observe Lent to manifest and deepen our share in the cross.

As a focused pursuit of the fruits of holiness, Lent is rooted in union with Christ, who is our sanctification.

Lent is the season of blood and guts and flesh. It is the supremely anti-Gnostic season.

Some say Lent inhibits the church's cultural impact. To that, there are three answers: Christendom, Byzantium, & Bach.

Lent is a pursuit of glory, because the Lord exalts those who humble themselves.

To observe Lent rightly, we need to be confident that the power to obey God is a gift from God.

Israel sought out and purged old leaven once a year. Lent is the Christian feast of unleavened bread.

For Christians, death is not end but beginning. Lent is an extended meditation on that good news.

Life is a Lenten journey through death toward resurrection.

Lent is boot camp for spiritual warriors.

Without Lent or something like it, the church risks falling into a victoryism without the cross, which is the weapon of victory.

Lent didn't keep Christians from converting Europe, forming Christendom, building cathedrals, celebrating carnivals.

Lent is training in the fundamental Christian discipline of waiting.

Lent is preparation for martyrdom. Nothing is more politically potent than a martyr.

Like the whole church calendar, Lent inserts “the fact of Christ into the rhythm of seasons, weeks, days and hours.” –Congar

We're hungry for all the wrong things. We need Lent to develop a taste for the fruit of the tree of life – that is, the fruit of the cross.

Purple is the liturgical color of Lent, a deep color of penitence, a lush color of royalty. Lent is for training kings.

The church year is an extended commemoration of the gospel story. Lent is long because the Passion is the biggest episode in the story.

An exercise in delayed gratification, Lent is profoundly counter-cultural.

Lent is catholic because it signifies our inclusion in the one, holy, catholic, and apostolic church.

Lent reminds us that the only God that is, is the God of the cross. Lent is a prophylactic against generic monotheism.

Lent is not a withdrawal from history. The God of Lent is the God who enters time, the God with blood to shed for us.

Lent gives the only answer there is to the problem of evil: A cross that triumphs over evil, a death that tramples death.

Some demons come out only by prayer and fasting. Seems a good reason to fast and pray.

The Christian year has a rhythm, each season its own tonality and coloration. Without Lent, the year is bland.

Without Lent, how many paintings would have gone unpainted? How many cantatas left unwritten and unsung?

Lent tells us what time it is – the time between resurrection and resurrection.

Lent reminds us that Jesus didn't go to the cross so we can escape the cross; He went to the cross to enable us to bear it after Him.

Lent gives us 40 days to contemplate the glory of the Crucified, which saves the world.

Lent is a focused effort to identify and smash idols. Lent is boot camp for Josiahs.

Lent teaches us that the Name we bear has the weight of a cross.

During Lent, we contemplate the obedience of the Son so as to become sons who honor our Father and fathers.

Lent rebuilds marriages, as we commune with the Perfect Husband who gave Himself wholly for His Bride.

Lent is a minor movement in the symphony of the church year, the dissonance that opens into the resolution of Easter.

Lent inoculates against sentimentalism.

Lent tunes us to the broken beauty of the world.

Lent strips off layers of self-deception and self-defense that screen us from the Risen Christ.

Lent is not for doing things we never do otherwise. Like Sunday, Lent is for intensifying things we do all the time.

The church year is painted in chiaroscuro. Without the darker hues of Lent, Easter is two-dimensional.

Lent teaches us to cross our eyes: "For if the eye seek good objects, and will take / No cross from bad, we cannot 'scape a snake." -Donne

Almighty and everlasting God, you hate nothing you have made and forgive the sins of all who are penitent: Create and make in us new and contrite hearts, that we, worthily lamenting our sins and acknowledging our wretchedness, may obtain of you, the God of all mercy, perfect remission and forgiveness; through Jesus Christ our Lord, who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, for ever and ever. Amen.

Slowly pray through the Psalm(s) and then if you have the time, read through one or both of the Old and New Testament passages. Notice if a word or phrase catches your eye or moves your heart.....meditate on it and pray your thoughts, desires, needs, and feelings.

Thursday: Psalm 37:1-18 / Habakkuk 3:1-18 / Philippians 3:12-21

Friday: Psalm 31, 95 / Ezekiel 18:1-4; 18:25-32 / Philippians 4:1-9

Saturday: Psalm 30, 32 / Ezekiel 39:21-29 / Philippians 4:10-20

COMMUNION

The Lord's Prayer

The status quo is too alluring. It is the air we breathe, the food we eat, the six-thirty news, our institutions, theologies, and politics. The only way we shall break its hold on us is to be transferred to another dominion, to be cut loose from our old certainties, to be thrust under the flood and then pulled forth fresh and newborn. Baptism takes us there.

Let us stress once more that the purpose of Lent is not to force on us a few formal obligations but to “soften” our heart so that it may open itself to the realities of the spirit, to experience the hidden “thirst and hunger” for communion with God.

“When I’m working as an artist-in-residence at parochial schools, I like to read the psalms out loud to inspire the students, who are usually not aware that the snippets they sing at Mass are among the greatest poems in the world. But I have found that when I have asked children to write their own psalms, their poems often have an emotional directness that is similar to that of the Biblical Psalter. They know what it’s like to be small in a world designed for big people, to feel lost and abandoned. Children are frequently astonished to discover that the psalmists so freely express the more unacceptable emotions, sadness and even anger, even anger at God, and all of this is in the Bible that they hear read in church on Sunday morning.

Children who are picked on by their big brothers and sisters can be remarkably adept when it comes to writing cursing psalms, and I believe that the writing process offers them a safe haven in which to work through their desires for vengeance in a healthy way. Once a little boy wrote a poem called, “The Monster Who Was Sorry.” He began by admitting that he hates it when his father yells at him: his response in the poem is to throw his sister down the stairs, and then to wreck his room, and finally to wreck the whole town. The poem concludes: “Then I sit in my messy house and say to myself, ‘I shouldn’t have done all that.’”

“My messy house” says it all: with more honesty than most adults could have mustered, the boy made a metaphor for himself that admitted the depth of his rage and also gave him a way out. If that boy had been a novice in the fourth-century monastic desert, his elders might have told him that he was well on the way toward repentance, not such a monster after all, but only human.

If the house is messy, they might have said, why not clean it up, why not make it into a place where God might wish to dwell?”

It is the crucifixion that marks out Christianity as something definitively different in the history of religion. It is in the crucifixion that the nature of God is truly revealed. Since the resurrection is God’s mighty transhistorical Yes to the historically crucified Son, we can assert that the crucifixion is the most important historical event that has ever happened. The resurrection, being a transhistorical event planted within history, does not cancel out the contradiction and shame of the cross in this present life; rather, the resurrection ratifies the cross as the way “until he comes.”

Closing Prayer for Maundy Thursday: Almighty Father, whose dear Son, on the night before he suffered, instituted the Sacrament of his Body and Blood: Mercifully grant that we may receive it thankfully in remembrance of Jesus Christ our Lord, who in these holy mysteries gives us a pledge of eternal life; and who now lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, now and forever. Amen.

Closing Prayer for Good Friday: We adore you, O Christ, and we bless you, because by your holy cross you have redeemed the world. O Savior of the world, who by thy cross and precious blood hast redeemed us: Save us and help us, we humbly ask you, O Lord. Amen.

Closing Prayer for Holy Saturday: Almighty and everlasting God, your only-begotten Son went down among the dead and rose again in glory: In your mercy raise up your faithful people, buried with him in baptism, to be one with him in the eternal life. We ask this in the name of Jesus, who reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, now and forever. Amen.

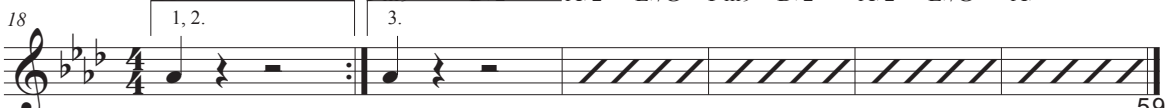
